Evidence Based Treatment

The Families First Prevention Services Act of 2019 provided an opportunity to increase the number of evidenced-based treatments being provided across the state with the intent to reduce child and youth involvement with juvenile justice youth services, child welfare, and juvenile court. This is being done by 1. Identifying the programs that work with these populations 2. Facilitate program development through subsidized training, oversight of implementation, coordination of service delivery and individualized program support and 3. Monitor fidelity to evidence-based treatment through the development, implementation and administration of standardized fidelity monitoring practices.

Service Navigation

The Service Navigation Team supports the Families First Prevention Services Act (FFPSA) Plan for the State of Utah through coordination of training, implementation and oversight/monitoring of evidence based practices; Parent Child Interaction Therapy, (PCIT), Trauma Focused Cognitive Behavioral Therapy (TF-CBT), Dialectical Behavior Therapy (DBT), Functional Family Therapy (FFT) etc. This team serves as the clinical experts in DHHS to ensure youth are referred to the correct services, at the correct dosage and for the clinically indicated amount of time. This team improves the service continuum by identifying gaps in service and developing ways to fill those gaps. 211 and the provider directory are maintained by this team to ensure information about resources throughout the state are accurate.

Intensive Care Coordination (ICC)

Intensive Care Coordination using the High Fidelity Wraparound model is an evidenced-based approach to family-driven, team based, collaborative planning for developing and implementing individualized care plans for youth ages 0-21 with serious emotional disorders and/or behavioral disorders.

Independent Assessment

The Independent Assessment team was developed as part of the Families First Prevention Services Act of 2019. This team is tasked with providing an objective clinical assessment for all youth placed in a Qualified Residential Treatment Program (Q RTP). This assessment must be completed within 30 days of placement and is sent to the courts for review.

Reviewers use professional evaluations and interviews with the youth, family, and treatment team to determine if the youth's needs can be met in a family setting or if they need a Q RTP to address the issues.

The Child Health Advanced Records Management program provides health data through an integrated and secure electronic system to health care providers to coordinate care, and improve efficiencies and health outcomes for children and families. CHARM links health data and services together so that important health information about a child is accessible for use. The CHARM system also creates a consolidated health record for children and enables authorized healthcare users and programs a way to share and track the health status of children such as newborn screening results, immunizations and referrals to facilitate more complete and timely health care services.

The Home Visiting Program oversees, administers, and provides technical assistance for communities across Utah implementing evidence-based early childhood home visiting models. Qualifying families receive two monthly visits from a trained professional using the Parents as Teachers or Nurse Family Partnership curriculum. These voluntary services improve outcomes for families and young children across six areas: maternal and newborn health; child injuries, maltreatment, and emergency department visits; school readiness and achievement; crime or domestic violence; family economic self-sufficiency; and coordination and referrals.
