Program Descriptions

The Division of Family Health

The Division of Family Health partners with individuals, families, and communities to improve health, safety, and quality of life through education, prevention, screening, assessment, monitoring, and interventions.

The Office of Children with Special Health Care Needs

The mission is to improve the health and quality of life for children with special health care needs, and their families, through early screening and detection, data integration, care coordination, education, intervention, and life transitions.

Adult Autism Treatment Account (AATA)

The Adult Autism Treatment Account Program improves health outcomes for adults on the autism spectrum, who require significant supports, by awarding grants to providers for evidence-based treatments.

Allyson Gamble Organ Donation Program

Children with Special Health Care Needs contracts with Donor Connect to promote and support organ donation and provide donor awareness education.

Autism Systems Development Program (ASDP)

The Autism Systems Development Program seeks to reduce the age of diagnosis for children with Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) by monitoring occurrence, promoting screening efforts, referring to services, facilitating research, and providing education and outreach.

Children's Hearing Aid Program (CHAP)

Children's Hearing Aid Program strives to optimize early communication for deaf and hard of hearing infants and children (up to 6 years) by providing access to hearing aids for financially eligible families.

Cytomegalovirus (CMV) Public Education and Testing

Educates women of childbearing age and community stakeholders on the risks of Cytomegalovirus during pregnancy and facilitates CMV testing on eligible infants to allow for early detection and intervention in an effort to reduce the effects of congenital infection.

Early Hearing Detection and Intervention (EHDI)

The Early Hearing Detection and Intervention Program provides oversight and support to healthcare practitioners and families to ensure newborns receive early screening, diagnosis and intervention for hearing differences.

Fostering Healthy Children Program (FHCP)

To facilitate and advocate for excellence in medical, dental, mental health, and overall wellbeing for children in Utah's foster care system.

Integrated Services Program (ISP)

The Integrated Services Program assists families of children and youth with special health care needs by facilitating direct clinical services, care coordination, transition to adulthood, and advocating for primary care and comprehensive health care.

Kurt Oscarson Children's Organ Transplant Fund (KOCOTF)

Kurt Oscarson Children's Organ Transplant Fund has a committee which authorizes financial support through an interest-free loan for children under 18 who require organ transplants.

Utah Birth Defect Network (UBDN)

The Utah Birth Defect Network seeks to prevent birth defects and secondary disabilities by monitoring occurrence, referring to services, facilitating research, and providing education and outreach.

Utah Critical Congenital Heart Disease (CCHD) Screening

The Utah Critical Congenital Heart Disease Screening program seeks to prevent serious morbidity and mortality resulting from missed or delayed diagnosis of a critical congenital heart defect.

Utah Family Voices/Family to Family

This program provides information and support to families of children and youth with special health care needs and the professionals who serve them from parents of special needs children. Families' needs and perspectives guide the program information and support. Individual consultations, group training, publications and web-based educational materials are continually provided, developed and enhanced through partnerships with other family and disability organizations throughout the state.

Utah Psychotropic Oversight Program (UPOP)

The purpose of the Utah Psychotropic Oversight Program is to improve the well-being of children and adolescents in foster care, receiving psychiatric treatment, by promoting safe, evidence-based, trauma-informed treatment, consistent with their mental health needs.

The Office of Maternal and Child Health

Our mission is to improve the health of Utah's Mothers, Children and Families.

Adolescent Health Program

The Adolescent Health Program provides sexual health education, parent education, positive youth development programs, and social emotional learning (SEL) resources through the Personal Responsibility Education Program (PREP), Sexual Risk Avoidance Education (SRAE), and Interagency Outreach Training Initiative (IOTI) grants. The program seeks to educate and empower youth, families, and communities to prevent teen

pregnancy, strengthen connections, build SEL skills, and improve adolescent health outcomes.

Data Resources Program (DRP)

The Data Resources Program works to improve the health of Utah women, mothers, infants, and children by providing epidemiologic support to Division Offices and Programs. DRP provides expertise on statistical analysis, data linkages, research methodology, survey development, and facilitates coordination of multi-program projects and reports. The program also plays an active role in designing websites and web-based applications and ensures compliance with DHHS and State web standards. An important responsibility of DRP is to provide coordination, compilation, and submission of the Federal Title V Maternal and Child Health Block Grant Report and Application. The program is also responsible for managing the Statewide Systems Development Initiative grant, which provides further analytic capacity for the MCH Block Grant and other MCH/CSHCN activities.

Maternal and Infant Health Program (MIHP)

To advance the health of women and infants through data analysis, education and healthcare quality improvement.

Our Projects:

- **Pregnancy Risk Assessment Monitoring System (PRAMS)** - collects information on maternal experiences and behaviors prior to, during, and immediately following pregnancy.
- **Study of the Associated Risks of Stillbirth (SOARS)** -collects information on maternal experiences and behaviors prior to, during, and immediately following pregnancy among mothers who have recently experienced a stillbirth.
- **MotherToBaby** -offers accurate, timely, and confidential information about the risks of exposures in pregnancy or while breastfeeding.
- **Perinatal Mortality Review** – Reviews maternal deaths and infant deaths related to perinatal conditions to generate recommendations for prevention. The goal is prevention of deaths by improving systems of care.
- **Maternal Mental Health** – promotes education about perinatal mental health conditions, promotes screening and referral for treatment
- **Preconception Health** – Seeks to provide education on how women can be at their best health
- **Stepping Up for Utah Babies** - A program that works with Utah hospitals to support breastfeeding in their facilities.

Utah Women and Newborns Quality Collaborative (UWNQC)

UWNQC is a state-wide network of professionals, hospitals and clinics dedicated to improving the health outcomes for Utah women and babies using evidence-based practice guidelines and quality improvement processes

Women, Infants and Children (WIC)

Women, Infants and Children is a public health nutrition program that supports families with healthy eating through nutrition education, counseling, breastfeeding support, health care referrals and by providing supplemental foods. These services are provided to low and moderate income women and their infants and children under the age of five.

Commodities Supplemental Food Program

The Commodity Supplemental Food Program (CSFP) provides relief to seniors (60+) facing food insecurity through a monthly food box of USDA purchased shelf-stable commodities. CSFP is available in every county in Utah.

The Office of Early Childhood

The Office of Early Childhood promotes and enhances positive growth, development, and learning for every Utah child from birth through age 8.

Baby Watch Early Intervention Program (BWEIP)

The purpose of the Baby Watch Early Intervention Program is to enhance early growth and development in infants and toddlers, who have developmental delays or disabilities, by providing individualized support and services to the child and their family.

Child Health Advanced Records Management (CHARM) Program

The Child Health Advanced Records Management Program provides health data through an integrated and secure electronic system to health care providers to coordinate care, and improve efficiencies and health outcomes for children and families. CHARM links health data and services together so that important health information about a child is accessible for use. The CHARM system also creates a consolidated health record for children and enables authorized healthcare users and programs a way to share and track the health status of children such as newborn screening results, immunizations and referrals to facilitate more complete and timely health care services.

Early Childhood Utah Program (ECU)

The Early Childhood Utah Program facilitates the work of the Early Childhood Utah Advisory Council which brings statewide early childhood partners together to improve system-wide collaboration and coordination. The Early Childhood Utah Program also helps families and early childhood programs understand child developmental milestones and how to use the Ages and Stages Questionnaires®, to support optimal child development helping programs/providers screen and help children hit developmental milestones. The Early Childhood Utah program facilitates Early Childhood Integrated Data System (ECIDS) developing data systems and data infrastructure in order to effectively collect, analyze and use data to drive smart and effective policy, funding and programmatic decisions.

Home Visiting Program

The Home Visiting Services and Support Program oversees, administers, and provides technical assistance for communities across Utah implementing evidence-based early childhood home visiting models. Qualifying families receive two monthly visits from a trained professional using the Parents as Teachers or Nurse Family Partnership curriculum.

These voluntary services improve outcomes for families and young children across six areas: maternal and newborn health; child injuries, maltreatment, and emergency department visits; school readiness and achievement; crime or domestic violence; family economic self-sufficiency; and coordination and referrals.

Weber-Morgan Early Intervention Program

The Weber-Morgan Early Intervention Program provides individualized support and services designed to help families enhance the development and learning of their children, ages birth to three in Weber and Morgan Counties, who have developmental delays or disabilities. Services are provided in the child's natural environment through a family coaching model that focuses on helping children meet outcomes in all areas of development.

The Division of Population Health

The Office of Health Promotion and Prevention

Healthy Environments Active Living (HEAL)

The HEAL program works to create community-clinical linkages and improve education, policy, built environment, and access to quality care in preventing and managing chronic diseases. HEAL promotes policies at birthing facilities, childcare centers, schools, worksites and in the community. HEAL promotes TOP Star (Teaching Obesity Prevention in Childcare Centers) which increases nutrition and physical activity policies and reduces screen time among young children. In schools, HEAL promotes CSPAP (Comprehensive School Physical Activity Programs) a framework supporting children to get at least 60 minutes of physical activity per day. Also in schools, HEAL works to improve nutrition by encouraging recess before lunch, Smarter Lunchrooms, and breakfast in the classroom.

Violence and Injury Prevention Program (VIPP)

The Violence and Injury Prevention Program has an overarching goal to understand why violence and injuries occur, their consequences, and the most effective ways to prevent violence and injuries from happening in the first place. To do this, they use data and other research to systematically collect information about the magnitude, scope, characteristics and consequences of violence and injuries. VIPP partners with all 13 local health districts in Utah, funding and supporting them to address violence and injury prevention topics. VIPP collects data, increases public awareness, provides prevention funding, and offers prevention services for child injuries and fatalities, child maltreatment, dating and domestic violence fatalities, falls, motor vehicle injuries, prescription drug overdoses, rape and sexual assaults, school-based injuries, suicides, traumatic brain injuries, and violent deaths. VIPP also administers the Traumatic Brain Injury (TBI) Fund as well as the Spinal Cord Injury (SCI) and TBI Rehabilitation Fund.

Baby Your Baby (BYB)

The mission of the Baby Your Baby program is to improve awareness, education, resources and access to, and utilization of appropriate and adequate prenatal care services ultimately improving the overall health and welfare of Utah infants and women in their childbearing years. Baby Your Baby staffs a 1-800 statewide hotline to provide information on referral sources, give financial information, and answer questions relating to different aspects of prenatal and well-child care.

The Office of Primary Care and Rural Health

Oral Health

The mission of Oral Health is to advance the general health and well-being of all Utahns by promoting oral health and preventing oral disease. The program promotes good oral health, dental sealants, fluoride varnish application and regular dental care.
