Rhonda Siegel, MS.Ed., is the New Hampshire Title V Director and MCH Section Administrator. Rhonda Siegel has dedicated most of her professional life to the health and well-being of the people of New Hampshire. She began her career as a local hospital Reproductive and Family Planning Community Health Educator and Counselor, first in Philadelphia and then in New Hampshire. Ms. Siegel moved on to the New Hampshire Department of Health and Human Services, where she became a Health Promotion Advisor, first for the State's Family Planning Program then for the Injury Prevention Program. Ms. Siegel was subsequently promoted to Program Manager of the Injury Prevention and Adolescent Health Program, and then to her current position as Title V Director and Administrator of the Maternal and Child Health Section, in the Division of Public Health Services in 2014. Ms. Siegel earned a bachelor's degree and a MS.Ed. degree from the University of Pennsylvania, in Philadelphia. She is the proud mother of four young adult daughters.

Laura K. Suzuki, PhD, MPH, RN, CPH, is the MCH Data Scientist and has more than twenty years of experience working in the field of maternal and child health, both as a practitioner and as a researcher. Her research has focused on the impact of intimate partner violence, including reproductive coercion, on a pregnancy and its association with adverse birth outcomes. Dr. Suzuki has ten years of operational public health experience managing Title V maternal and child health programs including nurse home visiting, prenatal care, childhood immunizations, and clinical services in local and state government settings. She also holds the Certified in Public Health (CPH) credential. Carolyn K. Nyamasege, PhD, is a contracted 1.0 FTE MCH Epidemiologist affiliated to the University of New Hampshire. Some of her responsibilities in the Maternal and Child Health (MCH) section include grant writing, research, performing data linkages, analysis and dissemination of birth records data, maternal deaths, hospital discharge data, Medicaid data, and other data sets within or available to MCH. Her analysis identifies disparities in care through various disaggregation e.g. by payer, race, and other social determinants of health.
